The Collect

(This reading picks up following the healing of the lame man who sat on the steps of the Temple begging. It has attracted a crowd)

¹² When Peter saw this, he said to them: "Fellow Israelites, why does this surprise you? Why do you stare at us as if by our own power or godliness we had made this man walk? ¹³ The God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the God of our fathers, has glorified his servant Jesus. You handed him over to be killed, and you disowned him before Pilate, though he had decided to let him go. ¹⁴ You disowned the Holy and Righteous One and asked that a murderer be released to you. ¹⁵ You killed the author of life, but God raised him from the dead. > Gospel Reading Luke 24 36b-48

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you O Lord.

36 While they were still talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you."

37 They were startled and frightened, thinking they saw a ghost. 38 He said to them, "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts rise in your minds? 39 Look at my hands and my feet. It is I myself! Touch me and see; a ghost does not have flesh and bones, as you see I have."

40 When he had said this, he showed them his hands and feet. 41 And while they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement, he asked them, "Do you have anything here to eat?" 42 They gave him a piece of broiled fish, 43 and he took it and ate it in their presence.

44 He said to them, "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms."

Reflection

The lectionary readings set for today from Acts and gospel seem to be out of context which can seem confusing. This event recorded in Acts happened after the Ascension of Jesus and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, which we are yet to commemorations in the church calendar. This is the emerging church at work, obeying Jesus' command given in the Gospel reading, to take the message of the Kingdom to the world.

Those of you familiar with the book of Acts will know that the preceding event was the healing of a crippled man who sat and begged at the Temple steps. We pick up with Peter's bold preaching to the crowd that gathered.

This caused a commotion which resulted in Peter and John, being rough handled, arrested and imprisoned overnight. The next day they are brought before what must have been a large gathering for it included the 'rulers, elders, and scribes with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, and Alexander, and all who were of the high-priestly family.' There must have been 'three-line whip' to bring together such an assembly and so quickly.

The 'Jesus effect' had not 'gone away' as they had no doubt hoped following his crucifixion. This was serious. The questions they ask seems of Peter and John almost inane. They have no interest in the healed man, or Peter's quite lengthy explanation given at the time, their only concern is that something odd and powerful is happening which must be controlled. "By what power or by what name did you do this?" they ask.

In response Peter delivers another blistering speech. He does not address their question about permission and regulation but rather that what has been done is in the name of Jesus, the man whose death they instigated and who has been raised from death by God. This Jesus is the 'stone', the cornerstone of all else, prophesied in their scriptures, as is their rejection of it. Physical healing is only the beginning, for Peter's claim is that nothing less than salvation is at stake.

There is an interesting ending to this conversation. In their eyes Peter and John are 'unlearned and ignorant men' but they also 'marvelled and took knowledge of them that they had been with Jesus.' A telling phrase. Further, the evidence that 'this Jesus' has not gone away is the man standing (literally) in front of them, and they could say nothing. Peter and John were commanded not to teach in this name, which of course they ignored, and the rest, is, as they say, history.

The name of Jesus resonates through the New Testament as the source and energy and directive for all that the Christian Community does: its worship, its care for its members and those beyond, and its challenge to corrupt structures of power, so evident in our time in Latin American Liberation theology.

The Greek word 'parrhesia' is used 31 times in the New Testament it means boldness, confidence, courage, and fearlessness. It is used in today's reading: 'Now when they saw the BOLDNESS of Peter and John ...' Their boldness was not consistent with 'uneducated' men in the face of authorities. Peter and John would not be intimidated. This is what happens to companions of Jesus.

Believing and receiving Jesus into our lives is a deliberate act on our part in which we receive forgiveness and more. We find ourselves in a relationship with God the Father. This is why Jesus can teach us to pray 'Our Father' for we are indeed, as John says in the Epistle, children of the kingdom.

One of the introductions to the Lord's prayer in the service is: 'As our Saviour has commanded and taught us, we are bold to say: Our Father; Indeed, we are 'bold to say', because our confidence and boldness to call God our Father, comes from what has been done for us by Jesus the Good Shepherd who has brought us into the safe keeping of his fold.
