The Greeting

Grace, mercy, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

HYMN

Come, let us join our cheerful songs with angels round the throne; ten thousand thousand are their tongues, but all their joys are one.

'Worthy the Lamb that died,' they cry, 'to be exalted thus'; 'Worthy the Lamb,' our lips reply, 'for he was slain for us.' Jesus is worthy to receive honour and power divine; and blessings, more than we can give, be, Lord, for ever thine.

Let all that dwell above the sky, and air, and earth, and seas, conspire to lift thy glories high, and speak thine endless praise.

The whole creation joins in one to bless the sacred name of him that sits upon the throne, and to adore the Lamb.

Invitations to Confession

The Collect

A reading from the Old Testament Deuteronomy 30. 9-14

9 Then the Lord your God will make you most prosperous in all the work of your hands and in the fruit of your womb, the young of your livestock and the crops of your land. The Lord will again delight in you and make you prosperous, just as he delighted in your ancestors, 10 if you obey the Lord your God and keep his commands and decrees that are written in this Book of the Law and turn to the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul.

The Offer of Life or Death

A reading from the New Testament 1 Colossians 1. 1-14

1 Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother,

2 To God's holy people in Colossae, the faithful brothers and sisters in Christ:

Grace and peace to you from God our Father.

3 We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, 4 because we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love you have for all God's people— 5 the faith and love that spring from the hope stored up for you in heaven and about which you have already heard in the true message of the gospel 6 that has come to you. In the same way, the gospel is bearing fruit and growing throughout the whole world—just as it has been doing among you since the day you heard it and truly understood God's grace. 7 You learned it from Epaphras, our dear fellow servant, who is a faithful minister of Christ on our[d] behalf, 8 and who also told us of your love in the Spirit.

9 For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you. > The Gospel Luke 10. 25-37 Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia. I am the way, the truth, and the life, says the Lord No one comes to the Father except through me Alleluia.

The Holy Gospel is from the 10th chapter of the Gospel of Luke beginning at the 25th verse. Glory to you O Lord

25 On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

26 "What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?"

27 He answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'"

28 "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live."

29 But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbour?"

30 In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. 31 A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. 32 So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33 But a Samaritan, as he travelled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. 34 He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. 35 The next day he took out two denarii[e] and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

36 "Which of these three do you think was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?"

37 The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

This is the Gospel of the Lord Praise to you O Christ

Reflection

The parable of the good Samaritan is so well known that you might imagine it was in all four gospels. But in fact, only Luke recounts this incident. It is typical of his work. Luke is the only non-Jewish writer in the New Testament. He is not interested in proving Jesus is the Messiah from Jewish prophecy like Matthew. Luke is a doctor, and he is interested in people. This parable, and that of the 'Prodigal Son', also only in Luke, give us vivid, human stories that catch our attention.

A lawyer (the man in charge of how things ought to be: the Law) asked Jesus what he had to do to be saved. Note that he asked it to test Jesus. Was he really interested in the reply? Or was this another occasion when the authorities are trying to trip Jesus up, catch him out, give him a question the answer to which will expose his position, politically, socially, theologically? Expose a weakness in knowledge of the Jewish Law or radical tendencies, or even madness.

Jesus knew the man already knew the rules, so he asked what was in the Law. The lawyer answered correctly, as lawyers are supposed to, and Jesus says, "Do that and you will live." Which should have really ended the conversation, but like a dog with a bone, the Lawyer is not going to leave it there. "Ah...but who is my neighbour?" Now they are sure to find him out. In their controlled world there were definite division between who was 'in' and who was 'out'. We can imagine the crowd, nodding and smiling acknowledging the Lawyer's astuteness.

But Jesus is also smart. He is not going to get drawn into a discussion about the Law with a Lawyer. So he tells a story – a parable.

Parables can bypass our usual defences and convince us of truths we have been unable to see or hear because of the way that we hear. We filter the world through a particular view which obscures and distorts. We think we see clearly and understand but – we don't.

Parables tell us we are wrong about the way we see the world. They tell us that what we always thought was true is not, but they do not tell us what is true. That's important. We have to figure it out for ourselves. It is like wearing distorted lenses, or worse trying to look through binoculars with the lens covers still on – we just don't see.

Parables can free us in a way that instruction, knowledge, advice, cannot. All of that can just be another distorting lens. Jesus tells a story which if we really hear it – let it sink into us, question us, correct us, clear our vision and understanding – can be transformative. Which is its intention. A parable is able to correct stories about the world and ourselves that we have misunderstood, misinterpreted.

The Lawyer already knew the Law, what to 'do', but Jesus had to break down his world view, his distortion. If he had told the story and the Priest or the Levite helped the man, that would only have reinforced the Lawyer's tight, constricted, defined view of the world. "Yes, that's good advice, we Lawyers and Priests and Scribes etc. we have got it right, see what a good example we set etc."

But Jesus crashes right through this and leaves it with a question.

If you decide who you will help and who is your neighbour then your circle is very small. Because, after all, we must be sensible and careful for there is great scarcity. Look after your own. But, if you were the man in the ditch, it's all reversed. Who would help you if you were in trouble? You would be grateful for help from anyone. Jesus gives us the victim's view. Jesus is changing our perception; he is redefining our relationships for everyone in the world. He destroys our notion of neighbour to teach us that we are all connected, sisters and brothers with one Heavenly Father. If I cannot even see you as a neighbour, I cannot be your sister. The one precedes the other.

Hearing and seeing clearly enables us to break out of much painful and destructive behaviour and the feelings that lead to that behaviour.

We are not told what we should do. We are only left with Jesus' words – "Let those who have ears to hear ...and eyes to see..."

We believe in God the Father, from whom every family in heaven on earth is named.
We believe in God the son who lives in our heart through faith, and fills us with his love.
We believe in God the Holy Spirit who strengthens us with power from on high.

We believe in one God father, Son and Holy Spirit Amen

Let us pray to the Father through his Son who suffered on the cross for the world's redemption.

Fill with your Spirit Christ's broken body, the Church ... Bless those who lead the Church with wisdom... draw your people close to you.

Look in your mercy upon the world you love. Bring healing by the wounds of Christ to all who are weighed down by pain and injustice ... Be present with those in prison, refugees, those trafficked for gain the deserted, orphaned, unnoticed and unwanted. Father, in pity and mercy bring light in their darkness. For all relief agencies we ask your protection and continued help.

For those known to us who suffer need, sorrow, trouble, or sickness ... We name them in your love – and leave them there believing you know and care. Help the lonely and the betrayed, the suffering and the dying, Welcome into your presence all who have left this world in your friendship ... According to your promises, bring them with all who have ever loved you to share in all the benefits of Christ's death and resurrection.

Let us commend the world, for which Christ prays, to the mercy and protection of God. Lord in your mercy, hear our prayers. Amen

Being made one by the power of the Spirit, as our Saviour taught us, so we pray.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. Intercessions

HYMN
