The Gospel

The Holy Gospel is written in the 24th Chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew beginning at the 36th verse.

Glory be to thee, O Lord

36 "But about that day or hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. 37 As it was in the days of Noah, so it will be at the coming of the Son of Man. 38 For in the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, up to the day Noah entered the ark; 39 and they knew nothing about what would happen until the flood came and took them all away. That is how it will be at the coming of the Son of Man. 40 Two men will be in the field; one will be taken and the other left. 41 Two women will be grinding with a hand mill; one will be taken and the other left.

42 "Therefore keep watch, because you do not know on what day your Lord will come. 43 But understand this: If the owner of the house had known at what time of night the thief was coming, he would have kept watch and would not have let his house be broken into. 44 So you also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him.

Reflection

Only the gospels of Matthew and Luke give any reference to the birth of Jesus – but the second coming of Jesus the Christ is everywhere in the rest of the scripture both the Hebrew and Greek text (the Old and New Testaments.).

There has always been a lot of interest and curiosity about the second coming of Jesus; many dates set, many signs interpreted. Is it a great moment when Christians 'evaporate' from earth caught up in Christ and the 'rest' left behind? The scripture describes a particular extraordinary and unique event for which we must be prepared. In the inbetween time there might be another way that we can think about this, an interpretation of a second coming prior to this in which are involved now?

There have been two apocalypses (revealing) already. God has already been revealed in the natural realm – in creation, and he has been further revealed in the incarnation of Jesus. The person of Jesus was the divine 'apocalypse', revealing of the Christ (the Anointed One) into the world. (Apocalypse" is a Greek word meaning "revelation", "an unveiling or unfolding of things not previously known and which could not be known apart from the unveiling".)

Thus, the person of the Christ, whom we know as Jesus, is from before all time and creation and the future is his also. In light of this, might we also see the church the forerunner. Could it also mean that the second coming of Christ is the Church in this age, with the appearing of Christ at the end of this age? That Christ's second coming has in some way already begun through the church? (I can imagine my theologically minded readers already preparing their email response!)

If we have given ourselves to Jesus in belief and faith, we know a 'coming' into us of Christ, Christ comes to us as the Holy Spirit. Jesus said, "It is good that I go away for then the Spirit will come", and then he says, "I will come to you". In each one of us as members of his body the church, in the Eucharist and in the action of the Holy Spirit - Christ is always coming.

What, when and how this 'yet to be' coming will be, we do not know but it will. We who know and love him will then be with him and that is all we need to know. Jesus says the hour and day are not known except by God but don't let it come upon you as a thief in the night. It will be unexpected.

And this is something that Paul picks up on in his letter to the church at Rome, we are to Wake up and put on!

¹¹ ... wake up from your slumber, because our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. ^{...} So let us put aside the deeds of darkness and put on the armour of light. ... clothe yourselves with the Lord Jesus Christ, and do not think about how to gratify the desires of the flesh.

We are to get on with life, but we need to be upon the watch. As Christians we can never come to think we are living in a permanent situation. Rather we live in state of expectation. We are to live prepared, to check ourselves out, is there anything we need to address before our death. We do not know when Christ will return, we do not know if today could be our last. We live now to fit (or unfit) ourselves to appear in the presence of God.

The one great truth that these texts enshrine is that history is going somewhere. The stoics regarded history as circular. Every 3000 years of so the world was consumed by a great conflagration and then it started over and history repeated itself. Therefore, history is going nowhere, and that mankind was tramping around on an eternal treadmill.

The Christian conception of history is that it has a goal and at that goal is Jesus the Christ. There will come an ending of things as we now know them, the great Day of the Lord. Paul preaching to the Athenians tells them:

"For God has set a day when he will judge the world with justice by the man he has appointed. He has given proof of this to everyone by raising him from the dead" (Acts 17:31).

In his letter to the church at Ephesus he tells us.

For God had allowed us to know the secret of his plan, and it is this: he purposes in his sovereign will that all human history shall be consummated (ACHIEVED) in Christ, that everything that exists in Heaven or earth shall find its perfection and fulfilment in him. (Eph. 1 21).

Ultimately all things will be gathered up in Christ. For some it will come upon them as a meeting with one they have not known. But for those who have come to him in this life, it will the inexpressible joy of being with Christ. Yes, the words of the gospel are disturbing - they speak of what is to come, but recall the words of Jesus to those who loved him:

Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. (Lk 12.32).
